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MS. REILLY: Good afternoon. We are 1 2 going to begin the April 16, 2015 regular 3 meeting of the Teachers' Retirement Board. I 4 will start by calling the roll. 5 Melvyn Aaronson? 6 MR. AARONSON: Here. 7 MS. REILLY: Thomas Brown? 8 MR. BROWN: Here. 9 MS. REILLY: Raymond Orlando? 10 MR. ORLANDO: Here. 11 MS. REILLY: Sandra March? 12 MS. MARCH: Present. 13 MS. REILLY: Susannah Vickers? 14 MS. VICKERS: Here. 15 MS. REILLY: John Adler? 16 MR. ADLER: Present. 17 MS. REILLY: Thank you. We have a 18 quorum. Let's go to the next item. That's an 19 update on TRS operations. Each of you 20 received the latest calendar of events, and we 21 have an update from Ellen DeLeo. 22 MS. DeLEO: Members had their spring 23 recess this year from April 3rd to the 10th. 24 Our Walk-In Center saw a total of 744 members 25 compared to 978 last year. This year 93 0004

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applications in comparison to 119 last year.

members submitted their retirement

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3 Of the 93 applications submitted, 54 have a 4 July 1st retirement date, the most common 5 effective date for retirement. The members who came in to submit their retirement б 7 applications are early filers. In addition to filing for retirement, the most popular reason 8 9 for visiting the Walk-In Center during this 10 spring recess was for service by back related 11 questions. 12 TRS has started a campaign to reach out to about 14,000 members who have designated 13 14 benificiaries but did not provide the SSN of 15 their benificiaries at the time of 16 designation. Our communication will explain 17 the importance of providing the missing SSN and include a form in which they can provide 18 19 us with the missing information. TRS plans to 20 first contact retirees followed by active 21 members. An initial set of 500 letters was 22 mailed to our retirees on April 13th. A second batch is scheduled for May 4th to reach 23 24 out to additional 2,000 members. TRS will soon be offering our members 25 0005

1 the ability to submit their record of prior 2 service for service rendered with employers other than the Department of Education using a 3 feature on our website. To promote this new 5 feature, a postcard will be mailed in May to 6 approximately 20,000 Tier 6 members 7 encouraging them to use our website to claim 8 this prior service. For our Tier 6 members, 9 the new plan year started on April 1st. 10 reviewed the contribution rates for all Tier 6 11 members for the new plan year based on their 12 current salary. As a result, 6,723 members 13 had changes to their contribution rates that 14 were implemented on the payroll for the new 15 plan year. The affected members were sent a 16 communication informing them of change in the 17 contribution rate on March 16, 2015. 18 MS. REILLY: Thank you. The next item 19 on the agenda is the executive director's 20 report. 21 22 staff for helping to take care of the members

The UFT has awarded 23 him its highest honor, the Charles Cogen 24 Award; and whereas, Mel Aaronson is a 25 nationally recognized expert on public 0014

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1 pensions, serving as co-chair of the New York City Municipal Labor Committee's pension 3 committee, and president of the National 4 Conference on Public Employee Retirement 5 Systems; and whereas, Mel Aaronson has long been a fierce defender of public-sector 6 7 pensions and a tireless advocate for 8 retirement security for New York City's 9 educators and all workers; and whereas, Mel 10 Aaronson has dedicated his career to bettering 11 the lives of TRS members as a group and as 12 individuals, demonstrating vision and 13 integrity, wisdom and modesty, warmth and 14 humor; and whereas, Mel Aaronson, has 15 throughout his 35 years on the Board, shared 16 his experience, commitment, and passion with 17 the staff of TRS, all of whom will miss his dedication, his guidance, and his support of 18 19 their work; and whereas, Mel Aaronson is 20 highly regarded by all for his professional 21 accomplishments but also admired and cherished by his family: His son Paul, daughter Jodie, 22 23 son-in-law Miguel, grandson Ross, and 24 granddaughter Liza -- who has followed her 25 grandfather's footsteps and become a teacher 0015

and UFT member; therefore, be it resolved, 2 that the Trustees of the Teachers' Retirement Board and the staff of TRS express their deep 3 appreciation and gratitude to Melvyn Aaronson 5 for all he has achieved. We will sincerely 6 miss his leadership, his friendship, and his 7 winning personality. The staff has great 8 respect and affection for Mel, so we extend 9 our best wishes to him and his loved ones, and 10 we hope he enjoys the retirement he has earned 11 and truly deserves." 12 MR. ADLER: So moved. 13

It reminded me of this family that was at a funeral and the rabbi gave the eulogy and the wife, the children heard this, and after a while, the wife said to one of the children, go take a look in the box and see if that's your father. ADLER: The mayor couldn't be here 20 today but asked me to act --21 MR. AARONSON: I was waiting. I knew he 22 would be late but --23 MR. ADLER: But he asked me to present 24 this proclamation, which I would like to read 25 into the record. It says, "Whereas, our city 0022 Proceedings 1 has no shortage of devoted public servants who 2 empower its residents, bolster its 3 infrastructure, and forge its bright future. 4 Born and raised in the Bronx, Melvyn 5 Aaronson is the quintessential New Yorker, and 6 he has the big heart and strong character to 7 prove it. After graduating from CUNY's Hunter College, Mel began his illustrious career as a 8 9 high school biology teacher, inspiring his 10 students to embark on lifelong pursuits of 11 learning and discovery. When he won a 12 city-wide competition for the title of "Good 13 Guy", bestowed upon New York's favorite 14 educators by popular a.m. radio station WMCA, 15 no one except ever-humbled Mel was the least 16 bit surprised. 17 Whereas, Mel started his tenure with the 18 United Federation of Teachers, today the 19 largest labor union local in the United 20 States, as a chapter leader. Quickly 21 recognized for his dedication, compassion, 22 intelligence, and courage, he became a trustee and member of the board of the Teachers' 23 24 Retirement System in 1980 and was elected

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UFT's treasurer in 1998 and the TRS Board

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chairman in 2011.

As the leading national authority on public pensions, Mel has received many accolades, including the Ellis Island Medal of Honor Award, Charles Cogen Award, and the Jeanettee DiLorenzo Lifetime Achievement Award, and served as a delegate to the New York and White House Conference on Aging and to the White House Conference on Social Security, honors that testify to his profound impact.

Whereas, whether volunteering for UFT's first strike committee, serving on contract negotiating teams, or establishing a now thriving retiree chapter, Mel has used his voice to promote dignity and economic security, efforts that sustain New York's legacy as a pioneer of the labor movement and an incubator of opportunity, inclusion, and justice.

I am told that one day, not too long ago, a promising new teacher submitted her UFT membership card to her beaming grandfather in whose footsteps she had always hoped to follow. It might have been the proudest day

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of his life, but I hope today is a close second.

After fighting for decades to ensure happy and healthy retirement for his own colleagues, the time has come for Mel to thoroughly enjoy his own. May this next chapter be as great as the man who wrote it.

Now, therefore, I, Bill de Blasio, Mayor of the City of New York, do hearby proclaim Thursday, April 16, 2015, in the City of New York as Mel Aaronson Day."

And I want to just read 4 this proclamation which I usually don't do because you know, it's just words, and 5 6 sometimes you read things without feeling but 7 I really think this language captivates who 8 you are and what you have accomplished. 9

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So what I want to say is, "Melvyn Aaronson, the chairman of the Teachers' Retirement System of the City of New York, this commendation is to you for 58 years of dedicated service to the children of New York City school system; for diligently serving the United Federation of Teachers Local 2 as treasurer; for serving over 30 years as a trustee of the Teachers' Retirement System of the City of New York; for serving as the chairman of the Pension Committee of the New York City Municipal Labor Committee; for protecting the financial and fiscal security of more than 200,000 participants in the Teachers' Retirement System; for his dedication to his profession, members, and principles of equality; for never forgetting 0026

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1 his Bronx roots; for serving as president of 2 the National Conference on Public Employee 3 Retirement Systems; for his unwavering support 4 for public pension plans; for attaining the 5 admiration of fellow trustees and pension б professionals; for gaining the respect, 7 appreciation, and gratitude of all he worked 8 with; and for his tremendous contribution to 9 the City of New York, we give you this 10 commendation."

And now I just want to say something as well. I think that when the history of this city is written and we think about the fiscal crisis and we think about all of the roles you have played, two things I think you can be very proud of. The first is you have made it clear that teachers teach and protect kids, and even though you have been worrying about this pension system, you have never lost the ability to understand the connection between teachers and children and that I believe is your passion and the work that you do here reflects that.

So I just want to say on a personal level, we have had many meetings over the past

couple of years. I have more gray hair. You have held, as Sandy and others, Mona and all of you, you have held all the elected 3 officials and all the trustees to the highest 5 standards and you do that because you believe. 6 And you are somebody that we are not going to 7 be able to replace, but you are going to be somebody who we are going to follow and recognize, and I know that if we don't do the 9 10 right things, Sandy I know is going to say I 11 am going to call Mel. 12 MS. MARCH: Absolutely. 13 14

MR. STRINGER: So let me present this to you, and let's give Mel a big round of applause.

(Applause.)

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17 MS. REILLY: So Mel, we have a few more 18 awards for you. So this is from the staff at TRS, and it says, "Presented to Melvyn 19 20 Aaronson in appreciation for 35 years of 21 dedicated service, devotion, and commitment to 22 our organization. Your dedication and your 23 leadership will long be remembered, the 24 Teachers' Retirement System for the City of New York, April 16, 2015." 25 0028

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But I don't know if you noticed something was missing. So I wanted to be able to give you your gavel. For you as chairman of the Board.

MR. AARONSON: I know those of you who have been here before have heard me say similar things. The staff at Teachers' Retirement System is the most caring, devoted group of public servants in the City of New York. One of the things that keep teachers in teaching is their pension, and the kind of service that they get here at the Teachers' Retirement System for the most valuable asset that they have in their life is similar to the service you would get if you were a million-dollar customer for a large house that manages money for people.
